TUTOR APPLICATION

The Achieve Program at SIUC is a comprehensive academic support service for college students who have learning disabilities. These are regular students at SIUC who are enrolled in regular university classes. These students receive tutors and other services for their classes to enhance their chances of success in college. The students served by the Achieve Program pay for Achieve services above and beyond their SIUC tuition.

Tutors are hired to work with students on a one-on-one basis in specific content areas. The Tutor position is a student-work position and has many benefits, including:

Flexible hours
Work experience tutoring in your field
Satisfaction in helping someone reach their potential

Being a tutor for The Achieve Program requires a serious commitment on your part. If you're looking for just a job, this probably isn't the right place for you. Achieve is looking for people who genuinely care about the needs of the students and who are here for more than just a paycheck. If this applies to you, please apply.

In order to qualify to be a Tutor:

- You must be at least a first-semester Sophomore.
- You must have earned at least a B in the area in which you wish to tutor.
- You must have a 2.5 overall GPA.
- You must be accessible by phone.
- You must maintain confidentiality concerning the identities of the students you tutor.
- You must commit to a full semester of work as an Achieve Tutor.

In order to apply for the Tutor position:

- Return this form to Roger at the Northwest Annex, room C-116 and schedule an interview.

If selected to be a Tutor:

- You will have to get on the University Payroll
- You will be required to attend a paid training session(s)
